

For Immediate Release: East Bay SPCA Receives Grant to Save At-Risk Senior Dogs

[August 23, 2023, Oakland, CA] East Bay SPCA has received a \$7,500 grant from The Grey Muzzle Organization to subsidize at-risk senior dogs that often take longer to find their new homes. One such dog supported by the grant is nine-year-old Fez, a miniature poodle that arrived at East Bay SPCA as a stray. In his old age, he had become partially deaf and had severe "dry eye," which can lead to blindness. He also had several benign tumors and sensitive digestion. Our expert medical team began treating his eyes, removed his tumors, and put him on a special diet to reduce gastrointestinal inflammation. Fez responded well to his treatments, felt better quickly, and found his new home soon after. This grant gives senior dogs like Fez the veterinary care they need to be healthy and ready for their forever homes.
