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BEHAVIOR AND TRAINING

REMEMBER TO STOP & SNIFF THE ROSES THIS SPRING


Spring is here! As you jump back into your warm weather routines with your dog, we want to offer you some tips using behavior science so you can get the most out of your outings.

Why do we walk dogs?

Exercise is important, but many dogs don't get to appreciate their walks or runs because they are rushed through opportunities to use their nose. Dogs have over 100 million scent receptors compared to human's 5 million. So, stopping to smell the rose is desirable, meaningful, and enjoyable.

Decompression Walks, also known as "Sniffaris," are game changers for most dogs. Whether your dog is relaxed, reactive, fearful, or anxious, they can benefit from this type of walk!

The process is simple—walk your dog with the goal of getting them to use their nose. Seem simple? It absolutely is, and the benefits can be astonishing. Because sniffing is a brain-intensive activity for your dog, it is often more physically tiring than an aerobic walk!



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Take sniffing to the next level with these tips:

- Use extra-long leashes (we recommend Biothane longlines). These leashes allow for "off leash freedom" without sacrificing "on leash safety." And because they are made of Biothane, they won't get soiled as they touch the ground.
- Choose areas where your dog can lead the way. This might mean a local park, but it might also mean a tennis court, parking garage, or other low traffic area!
- Use foraging to lower heart rate. Scattering treats on the ground or in grass for your dog to snuffle up can be a wonderful alternative to fixating or barking while out on walks

SPRING IS HERE. SO ARE SEASONAL ALLERGIES.



For many pet parents of animals with allergies, springtime can be a challenge.

Winnie, a Bull Terrier, at the age of 4-months came to East Bay SPCA Theodore B. Travers Family Veterinary Clinic showing symptoms of allergies. She was placed on appropriate year-round flea prevention and given a long-lasting anti-itch injection. Winnie's pet mom, Jocelyn, realized that when she walked in grass, she'd break out in hives and itch incessantly. The medical team at East Bay SPCA provided Jocelyn with tools on how to treat Winnie's allergic reactions.

"Winnie loves grass, and it is the only place she will go potty. It is up to me to make sure I wipe down her paws with medicated wipes every time she walks in grass to help prevent a flare up of itching," Jocelyn says.


In addition to environmental allergies, Winnie also showed signs of food allergies. Again, the medical team at East Bay SPCA helped Jocelyn find foods she could eat through food trials. When Winnie was old enough to get environmental allergy testing, we discovered a full spectrum of things she was allergic to 13 out of 13 grasses, 14 out of 18 weeds, and 32 out of 33 trees!

With the results of the environmental allergy testing, our medical team created a customized plan to keep her comfortable, which includes a prescription diet, daily oral medication, an anti-itch injection every 4-weeks, immunotherapy treatment, and medicated bathes once to twice a week.

5 Tips for Enjoying Spring with your Pet

- **1.** Give your cat the opportunity to perch by a window and enjoy the sight of flying birds! Position a chair in front of a window or install a cat perch on the windowsill.
- **2.** Treat your dog to some dog-safe spring fruits, like blueberries or pears.
- **3.** Consider leash-training your cat and enjoy the spring air! Make sure the harness is properly fitted and your cat is used to walking on a leash (without tension) indoors before taking the cat outside.
- **4.** Try a new dog-friendly hike in the East Bay. There are so many trails to choose from, including in Redwood Regional Park and Joaquin Miller Park.
- **5.** Ensure that your cat or dog is on flea and tick prevention, so that your pet is ready to have fun in the sun!

Shelter Scouts is our youth volunteer program for children and young adults aged 8-17! Looking for something paws-itively fun to do over Spring Break? Check out our Spring Animal Camp for 1st-5th graders. Our camp is a typical day camp... with an animal twist! Campers will explore the world of animal welfare through crafts, activities, games, and animal meet-and-greets.

Behavior and Training Spring Classes Skill Builders (Level 1)



For dogs over 16 weeks of age who are comfortable being around unfamiliar dogs and people.

Foundation Skills for the Constant Companion: Training skills include recall, sit, down, door manners, polite greetings (i.e., no jumping), nose targeting, relaxation on a mat and polite leash walking. This course comes with a bonus video lesson that should be watched prior to the start of the first class.

Connection Boosters (Advanced)



Engagement Skills for the Constant Companion: You've got the foundation. Now, we'll teach you how to become the most important thing in your dog's world so that you can take her anywhere dogs are invited. As a continuation of the Skill Builders class, Connection Boosters builds reliability to leash walking and recall by adding in distractions and distance. Additional training skills include building focus, sit-stay and down-stay, wait in any location, automatic sit when stopping during polite leash walking, go to mat, drop it, and mastering play skills.
