SHELTER MEDICAL UPDATE

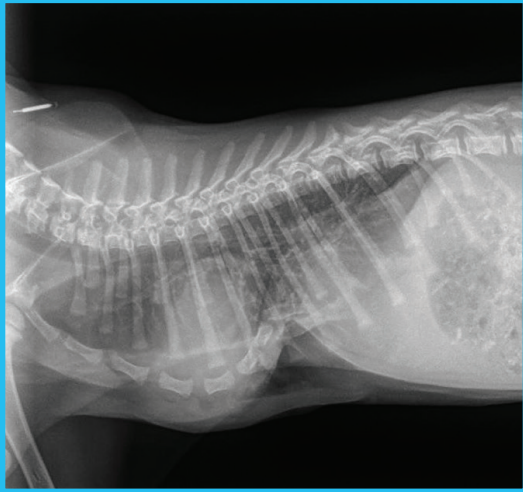
TOAST THE CAT GETS ROOM TO BREATHE

Toast came to us as a 10-week-old kitten with a prominent indentation in his chest. Sometimes a dent in your chest is just that—but in this case, with a breathing rate of 100 breaths per minute (rather than the normal 24)—it was cause for alarm. The indentation was compressing Toast's lungs, enough to cause a serious problem. Pectus Excavatum is a condition that can vary from mild, moderate, to severe. Toast's situation was severe. Left untreated, and at his age, this could have been fatal.

Our medical team sprang into action when they saw Toast's condition and rushed him into surgery. The surgery involved multiple, separate stitches placed through the skin externally, delicately avoiding his heart and lungs. They then wrapped the stitches around the back of his sternum and tied them to a splint. Prefabricated material didn't exist for this type of splint, so our veterinarian, Dr. Josie, had to get creative and use a plastic device with drilled holes.

Thanks to the ingenuity of our medical team, Toast's sternum repositioned appropriately. With a few splint adjustments, the help of an incredible foster, and Dr. Josie, Toast has begun his healing journey.

A special thanks to Toast's foster for giving him a home to recuperate. After approximately 6 weeks of wearing the splint, Toast's sternum stabilized allowing him to live a normal life breathing easy!

TRAVELING WITH PETS THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

DO'S AND DONT'S



If you are traveling over the river and through the woods to grandmother's house this season, here are some tips on how to prepare for your holiday adventure with your pet.

- 1.** When looking for a boarding facility, ask for a tour. The facilities should be clean, provide ample places for animals to rest as well as have positive mental and physical outlets for your pet, and there should be enough team members to provide care to each pet during their stay.
- 2.** If you are searching for a house/pet sitter, take time on the front end to build a relationship with the person who may watch your pets. Meet and greets are a great way to build your relationship and allow your pet to be comfortable with their caretaker. Always communicate a clear plan in the event of a veterinary emergency.
- 3.** If you decide to use medication to soothe your pet's travel anxieties, test out the dosage with your veterinarian FIRST. You want to know how the medication will affect your animal and be aware of any potential side effects.
- 4.** Bring a piece of your home with you. Pack your pet's favorite treats, toys, and blankets from home to keep them comfortable.

Something Sweet for Those on Four Feet

Healthy Vegan Peanut Butter Cookies [For You and Your Dog!]

The holiday season isn't just filled with delicious snacks for you, but for your four-legged friends as well. Treat your pup (and yourself!) to these soft-baked Peanut Butter Cookies. Made with whole food ingredients, these cookies are vegan, gluten-free, and sweetened with dates. Sweet, delicious, and FULL of peanut butter flavor.

Prep Time: 10 mins

Cook Time: 15 mins

Total Time: 25 mins

Yield: 8-10 cookies

INGREDIENTS

1 cup pitted Medjool dates
(about 10-12 dates, you can find these at your local grocery store!)

1/2 cup hot water

1/2 cup oat flour *(about 58 grams)*

1/4 cup natural peanut butter

2 tbsp peanut flour

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 350. In a food processor, combine dates and water. Puree until smooth. Then add remaining ingredients and blend until smooth (dough will be sticky). Using a tablespoon, drop dough onto a parchment paper lined baking sheet until dough is used up then press each cookie down with the prongs of a fork. Bake for 15 minutes.

Remove baking sheet from the oven and let cookies cool COMPLETELY before handling and storing them.

Soft baked, vegan, and gluten-free. The sweetness of the dates pairs perfectly with the nuttiness of the peanut butter and makes for a DELICIOUS cookie for both you and your pup!

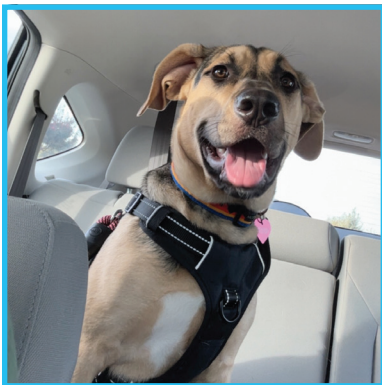
HAPPY TAILS

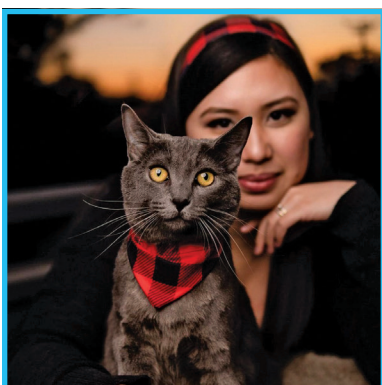
Luna,
